From the Desk of ISAAC





The Centre for AAC & Sign Language, Centre of Excellence, All India Institute of Speech & Hearing, Mysore in collaboration with ISSAC, India Chapter conducted a two-day Rehabilitation Council of India (RCI) accredited National Continuing Rehabilitation Education (CRE) Conference on the theme 'Bridging the Gap: Empowering Diverse Communicators with Recent Trends in AAC' on 11th and 12th January, 2024. Over 130 participants had registered for the conference from various states such as Delhi, Gujarat, West Bengal, Tamil Nadu, Maharashtra, Karnataka and Kerala. The highlight of the conference was the participation of neurodiverse individuals, caregivers, assistive technology specialists, special educators, social workers, speech-language pathologists, audiologists and post graduate students of speech-language pathology, representative enhances communication and language development's from AAC industry and representatives from NGOs. 

In the address by the chief guest, Dr Kaul emphasized the role of Augmentative and Alternative Communication in enhancing better quality of life of persons with disabilities. Mr. David Goldberg, Assistive Technology Specialist from New Jersey, USA was the guest of honour. Mr Goldberg gave an overview regarding NIKA project and how the project is helping people from developing countries in getting access to various high tech AAC devices. Ms. Bhavna Botta, President of ISAAC India chapter delivered the Presidential address. E-proceedings containing the full-length articles of the scientific sessions was also released during the event.

The two days Conference dealt with themes such as impact of AAC on beneficiaries and caregivers, advanced AAC devices & modalities, challenges in using AAC and more. The theme based sessions also had invited keynote talks by Ms. Bhavna Botta, President ISAAC about 'My Journey with AAC' where Ms. Botta used Aditi - foot switch paired with an AAC device for her presentation; 'Case Studies on Recent Advancements in Eye-Tracking Technology' by Mr. David Goldberg; 'Cortical Visual Impairment (CVI) and AAC' by Dr. Vicki R. Casella, Executive Director, The Bridge School, California; 'Efficacy of AAC Intervention in Persons with Aphasia' by Dr. Rajinder Koul, Department Chair & Professor, Department of Speech Language and Chair & Professor, Department of Speech Language and Hearing Sciences, Moody College of Communication, University of Texas, Austin; 'AAC & its Technology in Developing Countries' by Dr. Sudha Kaul, Founder, Indian Institute of Cerebral Palsy (IICP), Kolkata. Industry presentations included 3 Indian industries viz., Avaz - Inventions Lab, Deep Vision Tech Pvt. Ltd., Bangalore and NerdNerdy, Gurugram.

The highlight of the entire conference was the thoughtfully curated and practically discussed panel on the theme 'Challenges Towards Effective Use of AAC in India' moderated by Prof. Rangasayee R, Former Director, AYJNISHD, Mumbai. The panel included representation from all the stakeholders - Ms. Bhavna Botta (AAC user), Ms. Sweta Kedia (mother of AAC user), Ms. Madumita Dasgupta (Special Educator), Dr. Vineetha Sara Philip (Speech Language Pathologist) and Mrs. Lalitha Nagarajan (AAC manufacturer) served as the panellists. Various topics like problems faced by AAC users, special educators, speech language pathologists, AAC users, parents etc. were discussed. The panel consolidated few of the problem statements and listed ways to resolve.

Session also actively involved users and family members as presenters and during discussion. Participants had a conducted tour of the Centre for AAC & Sign Language, Centre of Excellence, AllSH, Mysore and Department of Special Education, AllSH, Mysore. Awards for session-wise best paper, appreciations to various teams who worked diligently for the conference were delivered. Prof. M. Pushpavathi, the Director of AllSH and other senior dignitaries joined the valedictory event.


VOICES FROM USER'S FAMILY

“Mridul came into our lives in 2008. It was a magical happy moment! He had a febrile convulsion during his 5th month. Our whole world tossed to the reality of his diagnosis. We understood that he is a Kernicterus baby affected with severe motor development challenges. Mridul gave me a new confidence to overcome this. It was difficult yet interesting. His father and I supported by my entire family took up this challenge of destiny as a blessing in disguise. Our business, relationship, bonding and outlook towards his diagnosis and treatment grew with his age and continues to do so. After the struggle of 4 years in Mumbai seeking a therapy for him, when we returned back to Kolkata, Mridul was 5. We approached IICP as our last hope for our son. IICP filled my heart with faith and belief that Mridul can actually live a quality life of self determination.

Mridul and because of him, I saw how AAC was introduced to him at a tender age and how liberating it was for my son to enjoy learning both academics and play. He learnt to use switches to play, then theme based picture-text communication boards and finally the alphabet board. He learnt to use his own communication board to prepare for his school interview and he used it successfully to answer questions addressed to him. He was introduced to the keyboard very early so that he could participate in the classroom functionally with his writing peers.




VOICES FROM USER'S FAMILY



A vast world now opened up for Mridul and us. He got admission in the inclusive school, AKSHAR with the teachers there, Computer teacher at home and the trainers of IICP collaborating such that Mridul was truly included in every aspect of his schooling. He switches spontaneously between using gestures, facial expressions, body language and augments it with assistive devices to emphatically get his point across. AAC has elicited his sparky, spunky nature as he jokes and chats with his friends, communicate with strangers he meets in his travels with family nationally and internationally. He is a student of class 9 following the mainstream curriculum. He is preparing for his board examination in 2025 with AAC support. Mridul will share with you some of his choicest experiences and achievements himself”.
